Mission and Purpose

WRHA is a Compassionate Care Facility.

Wanderers' Rest Humane Association, Inc. is the sole open admissions dog and cat shelter in Madison County serving between 600 and 1,000 cats and dogs each year. Having a contract with Madison County ensures that all unwanted or stray dogs picked up by dog control in Madison County will have a safe place to stay while waiting to be redeemed by their owner or to get adopted into a new family. Our doors are always open to individuals from all over who wish to adopt a dog or cat. We accept owner surrendered animals from Madison County, as well as individuals who reside out of county, if possible at the time.

Our Mission

WRHA is dedicated to providing the highest quality care and compassion for the animals entrusted to us, striving to enhance adoptability, and re-homing adoptable animals at the highest rate possible, while educating and leading our community in creating a more humane society. Through our public education programs, the shelter promotes responsible pet ownership and humane treatment of animals everywhere.

Wanderers' Rest is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) organization that welcomes any and all contributions, as well as volunteers and fosters, in order to continue to accomplish our daily goals and achieve our overall mission.

Comments from the Executive Shelter Manager

Whenever I tell someone that I manage an animal shelter, the response I receive is generally: "That job must be so fun! I would love to play with cats and dogs all day." I laugh and in return state: "It's the hardest job I've ever had." Obviously, this leads into me explaining why.

Working at a shelter is definitely one of the most rewarding experiences. However, the shelter environment can make or break you. You either thrive or you don't. There is no in between, but there are multiple reasons for this.

#1: The reception department

Day in and day out we receive phone calls for people wanting to surrender their pets for one reason or another. It's our job to listen, be understanding, and help them if possible. When we cannot help, we will provide other options. Our job is to help, not merely just turn someone away. That animal's best interest now becomes our priority. We hear the struggles of individuals in our community, the accidents that occur with pets, the desperation from people who do not know what to do, and the sorrow when pets are lost. Many times the individual on the other end of the phone is in tears and you badly want to be able to help when sometimes you can't. Sometimes they are crying because they don't want to surrender their pet but have no other choice. Then we have people that walk through our doors angry (and yelling at us) because they missed out on an animal or because they are blaming us that their dog is at our shelter (usually saying that we stole their dog). While we do get the heartwarming phone calls, the calls with interest in an animal, or calls with updates on adopted pets, answering the phones at a shelter can be a daunting task. In all aspects of this, it can be very emotionally draining, so you cannot let these situations get to you (even though in some circumstances it's near impossible). We do the best we can to help in every situation, which is why I am proud to be a part of this organization.

#2: Receiving animals

In this field, you have to be very understanding with the public and make sure not to pass judgement. Some situations cannot be avoided and we know that individuals sometimes wait too long to get animals help because they cannot afford it but also do not want to lose their pets. However, there are times when our emotions can run high, especially with some of the conditions in which we receive stray dogs or cats. Other times, the animals are in perfect health, but still leave us heartbroken for many reasons. The terrified dog sitting at the back of the kennel that doesn't know all you want to do is help him is distressing. The dog that is lunging at you because he doesn't trust that you will not hurt him is upsetting. The senior cat that was dropped off at the shelter who is now confused as to why her owner left her there is painful. The animal that was left outside our door or tied to a tree because we were not open at the time leaves us in tears. All these situations, which occur more often than you think, add to the stress that we feel on a daily basis. We know these animals need time, and more often than not, we see breakthroughs that let us know this animal will be just fine. But to get to that point takes dedicated staff and volunteers. We are here for those animals and we make it our purpose to help them.

#3: Animal care

Every morning, staff and volunteers show up to walk the dogs and then clean all the dog runs and cat kennels. This is very tedious and repetitive work. Our afternoons are filled with enrichment, intake exams, vaccinations, blood draws, animal assessments, medical checks, receiving animals, showing animals to potential adopters, and much more. There is never enough time in the day to get everything done on top of making sure all the animals are getting what they need to be made available. The stress of this can add up, especially when we are short staffed or have no volunteers. We have to manage our time wisely to ensure the animals get to where they need to be.

As much as we try to make the shelter a happy place, there will always be some type of dark cloud of sadness that follows, in which you just have to fight off and look at all the positive things that happen daily. Dogs (or cats) get returned to their owners, adoptions (especially for long-term or hard to place animals), donations from children who decided to collect items for the shelter instead of getting birthday gifts for themselves, our amazing donors and supporters, and multiple selfless acts from the community that never cease to amaze us.

While I love my job, I will continue to say that it is a very heartbreaking, stressful, and tense job, but it is also the most **heartwarming**. It's a place where we can make a difference, and that is why I truly love what I do.

Just like 2020, this last year has not been easy. While we have all been getting used to the pandemic, it is still hard to comprehend our current times, and the ever changing guidelines. Communication during these times is more important than ever. As a shelter, we expected to see a lot of returned adoptions or surrenders of pets in 2021 as individuals were returning to their workplace, instead of working from home. While we did take notice to this, it hasn't been as much as we anticipated.

Thankfully, we were able to host two of our biggest events, in addition to adding a brand new event to our yearly fundraising efforts. These events helped gain more supporters, meet our old supporters, and talk to members of our community about us and our future. One of our biggest accomplishments this year was hiring a Director of Development who has brought nothing but positive energy and great ideas/suggestions to the table in order to help Wanderers' Rest succeed and grow.

Animal intake numbers are continuing to decline. We did see more strays this year that stayed with us instead of being redeemed by their owners. While we have been able to continue adoptions throughout this entire time, nothing was better for our shelter than opening back up to walk-ins. We strive to consistently grow and mold to the current times, and we are always looking for ways to be better, to improve on our techniques and protocols. As we plan ahead for our new facility we will continue exploring new practices in the shelter's operations, staff and volunteer management, public involvement and outreach, and shelter related programs. I am looking forward to a great 2022!

2021 was a big year for fundraising and events at Wanderers' Rest Humane Association! I began my journey with the organization on April 26th, and it has been an absolute joy working with every Board member, staff person, volunteer, and of course, animal associated with this wonderful shelter.

We kicked off the early summer with an Annual Fund appeal to our entire donor base to reintroduce the concept and importance of unrestricted funds needed for the day-to-day running of the shelter, and we were met with enthusiastic support at a level we hadn't anticipated. For that we are so grateful.

Summer saw the return of what would normally be a spring event – Bone Appétit at The Lincklaen House in Cazenovia, N.Y. We had a terrific turnout and some very generous donors who bid on the many items and baskets that were donated by local individuals and businesses. The event was a great success and will be held this year again in the spring on April 30th. We hope you can make it!

Fall was spent in preparation for what was a brand new event for Wanderers' Rest: Poker, Paws, and Passion. Held At the Lawrence A. Appley Center at the White Eagle Lodge on beautiful Lake Moraine in Hamilton, N.Y., on December 4. The event provided us a chance to connect with a large contingent of people in the Hamilton area and show them what we do on a personal level. It also provided us a chance to meet folks face-to-face in a festive environment. We were lucky enough to have two wonderful musical acts perform: Pamme Swan on acoustic guitar and Eddie Vollmer and Friends. We enjoyed a beautiful buffet dinner, a silent auction, a complimentary beer tasting from Erie Canal Brewing and Seneca Street Brewery and so much more! We plan to hold the event again this year on December 3.

The Final, and most important part of the fundraising year took place when we participated for the 4th consecutive year in the Staffworks Save A Life campaign. Over the course of 33 days, Wanderers' Rest staff worked tirelessly to fundraise and steward gifts from far and wide, as well as right here in our backyard. When the campaign officially ended, we brought in \$94,564.67, which Staffworks topped off with an additional \$18,000, bringing our grand total to \$112,564.67 from 417 donations!

This was truly a great way to end the year, and gives us a NEW goal to beat for 2022!

Animal Care

Prison Program

Wanderers' Rest Humane Association, Inc. was excited to finally start the Veterans Canine Training Program at Mid-State Correctional Facility. We have had two successful rounds of training (currently on our third) and are proud to be making an impact.

Opening!

While we are open, we are continuing to prohibit the public from walking down our dog kennels as we have found this is the best option for getting our dogs adopted. It keeps the dog's stress levels down and it allows for the public to only see the dog's true personality (not how they act in the kennel).

In addition, we have created new hours to allow individuals with varying work schedules to be able to visit our shelter at some point.

Adopt

Our goal is to get every animal out of the shelter and into a new home as quickly as possible. Adoptions are the key to this success. We are continuing to try to make the adoption process more fun and easier, while trying to find a perfect match for each animal, ensuring each are going into a home that matches their lifestyle and will be the best environment. In 2021, WRHA facilitated 232 adoptions. We know this number has been decreasing yearly as the number of animals coming into the shelter decreases, in addition to being influenced by the current pandemic. However, we anticipate the number to remain steady for the current year.





Foster

WRHA's Foster Program was great this year, helping to save more lives. Kittens are very prone to illness in the shelter environment, which is why it is our goal to get kittens out into foster care as soon as possible to help prevent this. Fosters are an important asset to the shelter, giving animals a chance to get out of the shelter environment while waiting for a forever home. In 2021, WRHA sent over 50 animals into foster care, whether for a night, a week, a month, until the animal was healthy, or until that animal was adopted. Fostering is also important to get to know an animal's behavior in an actual home environment, which ultimately helps find them their best fit forever home.

Volunteer

Volunteers are the backbone that hold our shelter together. Without them, we cannot do what we do. We are so grateful to have the volunteers with the heart and dedication that we do. While we are thankful for each and every volunteer, we always like to give a volunteer appreciation award at our Woofstock event every year. This year, we honored Deb Norwalk for her consistent help with animal care at the shelter, as well as her dedication to helping at off-site events. Volunteers, like Deb, help keep our shelter in operation and give us hope in our current times.


